Working together














- Presents the voice of stakeholders: developed through innovative partnership of sea-users from the UK, Ireland, France and Spain.

1) Improving stakeholder participation in MSFD implementation






Stakeholder role:

Step 2: Develop and implement monitoring programme (by 2014)

Stakeholder role

- Collect data
- Assist methodology



2) Encouraging stakeholders to implement their own solutions, and encourage others.

- Modifying activities
- Decision-making
- Sustainable markets
- Codes of conduct, voluntary agreements
- Participate in stakeholder forum





3) Greater communication between stakeholders and stakeholders and government.

- Regional multi-sector forums
- Clear objectives, formal status
- Representative
- Funded
- International involvement?





4) Developing and implementing the necessary mechanisms for fully integrated marine management.

- MSFD alone will not deliver EA
- Cross-sectoral integration required
- Marine Spatial Planning









- Increased support and understanding
- Increased input of knowledge, data and information
- Increased integration and coordination
- Builds trust
- Long-term economic efficiency
- Reduces need for regulation

Challenges



- Stakeholder fatigue (involvement in many projects)
- Specific sectoral needs for engagement vary
- Challenges of working in a diverse group
- Lack of economic incentive to be involved
- Cost of being involved (loss of earnings/time)
- Policy drivers vary across countries
- Lack of a perception of a crisis or specific problem
- Previous experience with stakeholder engagement projects is not always favourable









- Statutory process
- Transparent
- Representative
- Minimise number of engagement processes
- Manage expectations





What next?



- Ecosystem approach guide to MSFD implementation showing stakeholder role
- Relevant to other sea areas
- Model for stakeholder engagement that can be replicated in other areas
- Ensure involvement in relevant sub-regions
